Now, we learned about the different household and furniture items. When we talk about just one furniture item, we use the singular form, like "one chair" or "a table." But when we talk about more than one, we use the plural form, like "two chairs", "tables", "three beds." Today, let's follow a conversation inside a furniture store to observe how singular and plural nouns are used in conversations.

Salesperson: Welcome to Fancy Furniture! How can I help you today? Customer: Hi, I'm looking for some new furniture for my living room. Salesperson: Absolutely! What kind of pieces did you have in mind?

Customer: Well, I need **a new sofa**. Do you have any comfortable **sofas** in stock? Salesperson: Of course! We have **a variety of sofas** to choose from. This one here is a three-seater sofa with plush **cushions**. And over there, we have **a loveseat** and armchair set.

Customer: Ooh, that **armchair** looks really cozy. Could I take a look at the **loveseats** too?

Salesperson: Sure, let me show you. (Leads customer) Here are our **loveseats**. They come in **different colors and fabrics**.

Customer: I like this blue one. It would look great with my curtains. How much is it? Salesperson: The blue loveseat is P13,000. Would you like me to add that to your order? Customer: Yes, please. And I also need a coffee table. What options do you have for **coffee tables**?

Salesperson: We have **several coffee tables** here. This wooden one has a simple yet elegant design. Over there, we have glass-top coffee tables too.

Customer: The wooden one would be perfect. I'll take that too.

Salesperson: Excellent choice. So that's **one blue loveseat** and **onewooden coffee table**. Anything else I can help you with today?

Customer: Actually, yes. I could use **a couple of end tables** to go oneither side of the sofa.

Salesperson: Absolutely. We have **these matching end tables** thatwould complement your new pieces nicely.

Customer: Those look great. I'll take two of those end tables as well.

Cashier: Okay, your total comes to P3,500 for the loveseat, coffee table, and two end tables.

When someone wants to tell say that there is one desk in the classroom, they would say "There is one desk." We use the phrase "There is" when talking about one thing. But, what if someone wants to say that there are many chairs in the classroom? They would say "There are many chairs." We use "There are" when talking about more than one thing. Now, let's talk about how we use 'there is' and 'there are' whentalking about things in our house. When we see only one thing, like one chair, we say 'there is a chair.' 'There is' goes with just one thing. For example:



There is a chair.

There are three tables

ables.

But when we see more than one of something, like three tables, we say 'there are three tables.' 'There are' goes with multiple things.


Topic: The Manila Cathedral and Binondo

Manila Cathedral (Background and Basic Guidelines)



V: No problem! It's important to be mindful of proper guidelines in churches.




Binondo - Manila's Chinatown
